- 2. Practical classes, in which we will work with specific documentation that allows students a more precise approach to the contents of the subject.
- 3. Oral presentations, presenting the results and materials worked, with the aim of promoting learning and the acquisition of skills in the field of presentation and public dissemination of the work done.
