

**SUBJECT****JURISDICTION AND INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION**

*Classroom (in person) mode*

The Practical Aspects of Criminal Justice course is part of the basic module (compulsory) of the Master's Degree in Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure. Its main objective is to deepen the practical application of the theoretical knowledge previously acquired in the field of criminal procedure. With a duration of one year and a total of 36 sessions, this subject, which is fundamental within the basic procedural module, is aimed at providing students with the necessary skills to perform effectively in forensic practice.

The teaching methodology adopted is characterized by a practical approach, encouraging the active participation of the students through the visualization, analysis and presentation of the different stages of the criminal process. Simulations and procedural writing are also used.

During the course, the students will be confronted with cases and practices, as well as 12 sessions of specialization seminars, in which experts in the field will present and discuss current topics within procedural law, with the aim of enabling the students to acquire a series of fundamental competencies, such as:

- Identify and assess the impact of law and criminal procedure on fundamental and human rights.
- Recognize the particularities of different types of criminal procedures.
- Compare legal and penal systems and theoretical models of investigation.
- Communicate precisely and in detail the legal classification of specific criminal acts.
- Interpret applicable legal and jurisprudential regulations in specific cases.
- Design procedural and substantive defense strategies.
- Represent the roles of the parties within the criminal process.
- Detect and resolve practical problems associated with the functions performed by different legal and penal operators.
